Accomplishments of 2024

Throughout 2024, Robert Morris University's IMA student chapter participated in events hosted on and off campus. These events included professional events where we hosted professionals from the accounting industry to give seminars and presentations on topics such as resumes, interviews, and specific accounting fields like tax or auditing, or held events for accounting students to network with multiple businesses and companies. We also hosted organization events where students within the chapter or club presented about similar topics. The student chapter also attended many volunteer events like making cards around holidays, volunteering off campus, and other related events.



Professional Events

Some memorable professional events the IMA student chapter attended last year were Accounting Day, the IMA Student Leadership Conference, and many others. Accounting Day is a massive networking event for our accounting, finance, and financial planning students. Numerous companies around the area send representatives to talk with students about their careers and promote their businesses. Students can connect with companies in Pittsburgh to secure future internships, professional events, and occupations.

Community Events

Since Robert Morris University is within a small community outside the city of Pittsburgh, students have many opportunities to attend volunteer events within the community. During the year, students volunteered at memorable community events, including a pumpkin patch fundraiser, card and blanket making for nursing homes, community garden building and updating, and various other events. At the pumpkin patch fundraiser event, students drove to an off-campus church to help move over 3,000 pumpkins off a semi-truck into the lawn for community members to pick pumpkins for the season. Assessment of 2024



Overall, 2024 was a successful year for our members. It was filled with events that our members and chapter impacted our community and organization. While we had many benefits with our chapter, we also had many drawbacks that we would like to address this coming year. Below is the final assessment of our strengths and weaknesses for 2024 and the need for improvement this coming year.

Strengths

Our strengths in 2024 were our connections to the Association of Future Accountants and Beta Alpha Psi and the shared events each organization hosted. Because of these connections, our IMA student members were able to attend numerous professional, community, and networking events. They also supported our organization and gave the IMA student chapter many opportunities to promote our organization to their members (as shown above in the member-hosted events).

Another strength our organization had this year was teamwork with our student members. Specifically, in the 2024 fall semester, student members Edward Feidelberg and Kaleigh Brenner worked together to complete the application for the Award of Excellence and advertising for our student chapter. No one member has needed to complete any application or presentation by themselves. This shows our student chapter's ability to collaborate. This teamwork has also led to learning experiences for our new members to become educated on the chapter. They are also given a chance to experience early leadership opportunities and responsibilities.

One last strength our chapter has shown over the past year is dedication to our members. We want our members to have a positive college experience and many chances to strengthen



their careers. We wanted to provide them with many opportunities to get involved and make connections, and I think we accomplished that goal last year. I only hope we can continue to provide these experiences to our members in the future.

Weaknesses

Our weaknesses include the fact that we are considered part of the Association of Future Accountants. We also do not have our bank account, leading to confusion when getting IMA scholarships or spending money for the chapter.

Another weakness we had last year was finding professionals within managerial accounting positions to speak about their careers and how they differ from those in public accounting. This would have also made our organization more acquainted on campus and given our IMA student members more information about the managerial accounting career path. Without IMA representation, most students never have the chance to explore managerial accounting pathways and stick to the favored public accounting route because that is most represented on campus and presented to students.

Plans for Improvement

We hope to continue to provide members with professional, community, and member-hosted events this year. We also hope to continue to offer more leadership and collaborative opportunities for our students. However, we hope to change this year and advertise more career professionals on campus and more distinct boundaries from the Association of



Future Accountants and Beta Alpha Psi. We hope this year will be a year of growth, teamwork, and success.
